Dear Friends

Dark Winter Nights Can Be Good For Us.

On 1st January each year an epidemic of fevered optimism sweeps through or globe. We take stock of previous years, and then huge numbers of us determine to make changes for the better: exercise more, get organised, keep to a budget, learn the piano. Local gyms report a 33% increase in membership applications in December and January. New Year resolutions are not part of a self-improvement fad of recent generations; there are records of ancient Babylonians making them 4000 years ago. We're still making resolutions despite analysts reporting that no more than 25% of respondents were committed to them after 30 days and only 8% achieve their ambitions. Why do we make resolutions when our failure rate is so high?

What creates our desire to make fresh resolves to improve our health, wellbeing and surroundings? All of humanity, Christian or not, is made in the image of God. We are made to be holy and made for shalom - wholeness and harmony with God, with each other and with creation. Perhaps we are drawn to the idea that a new year offers a new start because our God is the God of fresh beginnings, and 'his mercies are new every morning' (Lamentations 3:23).

Our rural environment reminds us that life begins in the darkness of the soil; that dark and cold create opportunity for dormancy and renewal. Maybe in the cold and dark of this season, we can use the quiet to consider how we have grown and changed in both the happy and hard phases of life. Rather than looking to the future and feeling apprehensive or fearful, we can settle into the realisation that Emmanuel – God is with us in the here and now and in the future. In the dark and still of a winter's evening we can ponder the wisdom of his love and faithfulness that: 'we will go on our way in safety, and our foot will not stumble. When we lie down, we will not be afraid; when we lie down, our sleep will be sweet'.

Before you rush into making any new year resolutions, take time in the dark, to meditate on *Emmanuel* – God is with us, who makes all things new: '...I am the Beginning and the End. To the thirsty I will give water without cost from the spring of the water of life'. (Revelation 21:4-6).

Our church services in January follow the normal pattern of Sunday services at 09:30 and Wednesday Holy Communion also at 09:30. On the first Sunday of the month we hold our Family Service when this year's theme will be animals of the bible – starting with the camel.

At 18:00, also on the first Sunday of the month, we hold our short traditional service of Evening Prayer – an ideal time to enjoy the peace and rest of traditional prayers and readings along with beautiful choral music.

May the Lord, grant you peace above all else no matter the circumstances and guard your hearts and minds in His great love.

As a young teenager, Tony Chappell was a keen railway enthusiast. He and his school friends would often travel the line

from Steventon Station to Swindon and back. On hearing of Dr Beeching's plan to close down more than 2,300 railway stations in 1963-64, Tony began to collect 'railwayana' from several stations destined for the axe. He persuaded his father to purchase a bench from the platform at Steventon Station.



The bench carried the insignia of the Great Western Railway in cast Iron scrolls on the legs. He recalls the sum of £2 10s was

paid for the purchase.

The fine bench became a handsome fixture in the Chappell's back garden at Victoria Road in Abingdon. Tony eventually moved away from Abingdon, leaving the bench in situ at his parent's home. Many years later, in 1986, Tony's father, Antony Chappell Sr., presented the bench to Christ's Hospital, suggesting that it might be placed in Albert Park. There it has remained ever since.



The bench currently sits at the South West corner of Albert Park, in an area of mature overhanging trees. This results in the

bench becoming bombarded with bird droppings (as too, anyone that risks sitting upon it).

The Steventon History Society believe this bench to be a significant part of the social history of Steventon. It is likely that the bench is around 100 years old and we think it deserves better care and attention than it receives at its current location.

We propose the bench should be released back to the village of Steventon in order for it to be refurbished and maintained in a condition where it can be enjoyed by all. The Steventon History Society would like to see it feature as part of a village History Trail to commemorate the site of Steventon Station. Please sign our petition to "BRING OUR"






Parish Council Report

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 4th December with 6 Parish Councillors, and several members of the public being present. Apologies were received from Sally Povolotsky, Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) Councillor and Vale of White Horse District Council (VWHDC.

Happy New Year

Sally Povolotsky has resigned from the Lib Dem Party but will continue to represent Steventon both on the Oxfordshire District and Vale of White Horse Councils as an Independent.

The bus shelter is to be repaired and a seat installed.

The barriers on the bridge over the Ginge Brook on Mill Street have been put in place by OCC to stop further damage by cars of the stone slab that has a crack in it. The stone slab needs inspecting from below by a competent engineering company, to assess what needs doing to replace or strengthen the weak area. The waterfall just upstream from the bridge makes access difficult. As water levels are high at the moment it's unlikely that any inspection will be undertaken until spring/summer!

Thames Water have applied for planning permission to undertake Clay Compaction Trials in the New Year.

Thames Water intend to undertake archaeological trial trenching associated with the Clay Compaction Trial in the New Year prior to a decision made on the planning application.

As part of the planning application for the clay compaction trial, due to programme constraints, Thames Water have negotiated with Oxfordshire County Council that they could undertake the archaeological trial trenching that is required to support the planning application during the period between submission and determination. The archaeological report will be issued as an update to their application.

To meet the application's target determination dates, Thames Water plan to undertake these works in early January. They are currently aiming to mobilise to site in the first week after the New Year's Day bank holiday (for

site set-up, fencing, ground protection matting etc) and then commence the actual trenching works from the 8th January. The archaeological works will be undertaken by Wessex Archaeology. It is expected the site works will take between 2 and 4 weeks to complete, depending on the weather and ground conditions on site.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Tuesday January 2nd, 2023, at 7pm in the Village Hall.

signature. I will keep going until we are successful.

My campaigning for more renewable energy run by the local community, through my sponsorship of the Local Electricity Bill, led to the creation of the new £10 million Government Community Energy Fund which will hopefully benefit groups across Oxfordshire.

And my campaign for justice for our local AEAT pensioners resulted in me securing the first ever independent investigation into their case, as well as a Parliamentary inquiry. I was also pleased to welcome so many constituents to Parliament this past year from schools to charities to members of the armed forces. I also hosted a local young person for work experience almost every month – thank you to all of them. If you are planning a visit to Parliament or would like me to arrange a free tour for you then do get in touch.

In 2024 I will be continuing campaigns on infrastructure issues like GP surgeries and Grove Station, as well as my other priorities like protecting our environment, tackling antisocial behaviour, and improving opportunities for children and young people.

Right now, as part of my campaign to improve our roads, I have my Local Roads Survey running so that you can tell me exactly where you are seeing issues on our roads that need to be resolved – including potholes, congestion, speeding and other safety concerns. Since being elected I have spoken in 13 separate debates about the need to improve our local roads, met with the Roads Minister to raise it with them, led a debate in Parliament on safety issues on the A34 and A420 and welcomed the £3 million for this year from Government to help fix Oxfordshire's potholes.

GARD is a local community group formed to campaign against Thames Water's proposals to build a reservoir south-west of Abingdon.

At the time of writing (13th December) the Secretary of State for DEFRA (Stephen Barclay) has not made any decision on Thames Water's reservoir plans. So there is still time for you and our MPs to influence his decision.

If you sent your complaints to Thames Water in the consultation, and you feel that they have not answered your points, or you want to write against the new, larger, project, then we urge you to follow GARD's example and write to the Environment Agency and/or Ofwat and complain about TW's attitude. This is the best way to get your point across now (before EA and Ofwat produce their advice for Stephen Barclay). Oxfordshire County Council have written to DEFRA citing unresolved issues from the consultation (see above), as have Steventon Parish Council and CPRE.

There was good support for the anti-reservoir demonstration, organised by Steventon's county and district councillor, Sally Povolotsky, at East Hanney, outside the Thames Water 'drop-in' event on the Reservoir on 10th November. Inside the drop-in at East Hanney Memorial Hall, it was the usual 'brochure stuff' from TW, no proper details of the design, or about the 10-plus years of disruption, but lots of pictures of butterflies and birds in unspecified locations.

GARD remain absolutely convinced that there will be major damage to biodiversity by the reservoir project. We are taking legal advice on whether Thames Water's Environmental Assessment of the project, which we know to



be flawed and biassed, is actually illegal, not meeting the standards set down by the government.

Both the County Council (on the 12th December) and the Vale of White Horse (on the 13th December) have passed unanimous council motions re-affirming opposition to the Reservoir, asking for talks with the Secretary of State, and for the reservoir plans to be suspended until issues have been resolved. GARD supports these calls.

How to keep Christmas poinsettias 'looking good for months'



Poinsettias are a welcome burst of colour in the home over the Christmas period. They can be a particularly difficult plant to care for, but some tips can help them last for months. They are only really comfortable in damp warmth, so keeping them in hot, dry spots should be avoided. They do not like cool nights, very hot dry rooms or big fluctuations in temperatures.

So keep them where there is a constant average temperature, avoiding draughts, cold windows or even very bright spots that can get very hot in the middle of the day.

Finding the perfect spot in your home will help poinsettias to live longer. It is important to keep them well watered but waiting for the right moment to soak them is key.

They like plenty of water but let the compost dry out before giving them a really good soak.

Stand the pot in a sink full of water and leave it to stand for 10 minutes or so before letting the excess water drain from the pot.

Preventing mice and rat infestations

Essential in colder months when the rodents start naturally gravitating towards the warmth of our homes.

Thankfully a score of techniques have been devised to safeguard houses against rodents, including several that are chemical-free and safe for humans and rodents. "Planting mint in different spots around your garden is an excellent way to keep rodents out. The smell of garlic is also repulsive to rats. If they get too close to it, they'll think twice. Try squirting garlic water down a rat burrow. Rats have an extremely strong sense of smell, which they rely on to seek out food and avoid threatening situations. Lavender, basil, thyme and echinacea are particularly effective. Plants that emit a Lemon-like smell, known for their fragrant properties, these favourite plants and herbs will actually be offensive to rodents, since they have a very strong sense of smell. Citronella in candles and eucalyptus oil can also be used wherever traces of the rodent are spotted

Using simple ingredients like essential oils will stop mice from using common entry points into your home because they hate the scent. The three smells that the rodents particularly dislike are peppermint, citronella and bleach. You can use essential oils by diluting and spraying the liquid around your home. Because mice cannot stand the minty smell of peppermint oil, they will avoid it as best as they can. One of the benefits of using peppermint oil around the home is that is it safe for pets and children. Remember, that repelling mice from a home requires a proactive approach, as the rodents are highly intelligent. It's imperative to implement adequate cleaning routines like properly sealing your garbage containers, and avoiding leaving bags and cans open around the home.
